Through a Student Campaign they will learn about our community's resources and where to turn to when and if they or someone they know needs assistance. All raised funds will be locally used to support Montcalm and Ionia county residents. Students will have the exciting experience of rallying their fellow students and families together. T ogether, students will increase their desire to give, advocate and volunteer to make their hometown a better place to live and work.

Enclosed in this guidebook, you will find all the information you and your students need to organize and host a successful Student Campaign. Whether it's a week, two weeks, or a month-long campaign, our only request is that each building completes their Student Campaign and submits their proceeds on or before Friday, December 16th, 2022.

FOUR STEPS TO AN OUTSTANDING

Let's begin!

1. Gear up

- The primary purpose of conducting a student campaign is to introduce students to a community-wide project of sharing, giving, and volunteering.
- Learn and share how United Way of Montcalm-Ionia Counties and the programs we fund are meeting the needs of our community. Read Success Stories on page 9.
- Request posters and brochures from your United Way representative.

2. Plan your campaign

- Select a faculty coordinator to help recruit a committee to plan and execute your campaign. Your committee may consist of students, faculty members and/or parents. Consider having your Student Council, YAC, NHS, or Interact Groups support the Student Campaign.
- Plan at least one week of fun activities to help students understand the importance of community service and your campaign. Enclosed in this guidebook is a list of creative ideas to make your campaign fun and educational.
- Once a plan is developed, visit your school principal, and make sure that he/she approves and supports your plan(s), goal and timeframe.
- Submit your Student Campaign Registration Form to United Way of Montcalm-Ionia Counties before Friday, September 16th, 2022, and send out your parent letters at least two weeks before the start of your Student Campaign.

3. Conduct your campaign

4. Wrap up your campaign

- Schedule your finale date and announce your campaign results to a United Way representative.
- Celebrate your success and announce your results during a prep rally or school event. Post finale pictures to social media, tagging United Way of Montcalm-Ionia Counties.
- Thank your Student Campaign Committee and supporters.

CAMPAIGN COLLECTION

Follow these steps to collect and deposit funds from your campaign:

- All donations for your school's United Way Student Campaign should be held by the school treasurer, unless otherwise assigned.
- Keep track of all donations made, so you know where your campaign stands at all times.
- At the end of your campaign, request for a check made payable to the *United Way of Montcalm-Ionia Counties*. The check amount should reflect the total amount deposited into your United Way Student Campaign fund. United Way is also able to accept cash donations.
- Complete the provided United Way Student Campaign Report Envelope.
- Call a United Way representative to arrange for a pickup of your report and campaign collection. You may also choose to submit your campaign results and collection by mail or drop it off at the United Way office on or before Friday, December 16th, 2022.

Providing Community Supports to a Single Parent

Lisa is a single mother of three. She lost her job due to pandemic layoffs in 2020.

A benefit to being home with children was her ability to help children with virtual schooling. The downside to being home, was the loss of financial support and Lisa's inability to pay for childcare while she searched for new employment. Unemployment benefits were simply not sufficient to maintain the household and the family faced eviction.

Lisa remembered receiving information from her children's school about 2-1-1, a resource to h help her find services and programs within the community. She called 2-1-1 and was greeted by a friendly voice that listened to her situation and was able to connect her with numerous resources. Lisa appreciated the information and felt she was heard, supported, and energized to take the next steps in contacting agencies and securing help for her family.

Through the aid and support of United Ways' community resources and partners, Lisa was able to secure dollars for food and utilities and remain in her home. A local agency helped Lisa to find another job and to begin working on achieving her Associates Degree at Montcalm Community College. United Way resources gave Lisa the tools and knowledge to progress in life and keep her family safe.

The end of this story is a happy one – Lisa has hope for the future, a career path to accomplish a secure future for herself and children and a strong belief in giving back to her community so that all services that supported her are there for others.

Paying It Forward – Joe Shows Gratitude for the Help He Received.

Joe managed life well for many years. But, as we all know, life can be unpredictable and suddenly Joe found himself without a steady income, car, or home. Joe turned to United Way's partner agency, Have Mercy. Have Mercy is an organization dedicated to lifting people out of despair. Joe was provided a safe place to sleep, shower, and three meals per day.

Joe asked to receive information and assistance to secure employment. At first, Joe worked off jobs that enabled him to save enough money to buy a car. With transportation, Joe was able to find full-time employment. Joe promised the Have Mercy staff that when he was "back on his feet" he would bring his first paycheck to the organization to help others or to "pay it forward".

Joe kept his promise. He walked into Have Mercy with a big smile on his face and laid an envelope on the front desk saying "I am a man of my word. Please take this to help the next "Joe" who comes here asking for help".

When you support United Way, you support effective human service agencies like Have Mercy. Agencies that serve thousands of individuals, children, and families each year - making a real lasting difference in our community.



CAMPAIGN ACTIVITIES AND FUNDRAISING IDEAS:

- * Award the Best Class Campaign: The classroom that raises the most dollars gets invited to have lunch with the principal, favorite teacher, or possibly, a community dignitary.
- Caring Classrooms: Students pick a United Way focus (Health, Education, Income or Basic Needs) and decorates their classroom doors to match their focus. A United Way representative can vote on the best decorated and most creative doors.
- Community Service Project: Organize a student/teacher volunteer day at a United Way funded agency. Make arrangements by calling your United Way representative.
- ❖ Dunk the Principal/Teacher: Have students pay to nominate their principal or teacher as a dunk tank recipient. The teachers or faculty members with the most money, wins a 5 min visit on the dunk tank seat. The highest contributors get to take their shot at the bullseye. For another \$5, they can walk up and press the "dunk" button.
- ❖ Jingle Contest: Hold a United Way jingle-writing contest. The top winning jingles can be sung by
- the jingle's composers for United Way representatives. As a prize, the winner can be showcased on United Way's website and social media.
- * Mini-Olympics: Create some unique competitions like the fastest unloading of a locker, the most books carried with one hand, etc. Sell seat tickets to raise money for United Way.
- Penny Wars: Penny wars are popular fundraisers that are easy to organize. This activity allows you to create your own rules, timeframe, and awards. They can be done as a competition against classrooms, grade levels, buildings, etc.
- * Pie in the Face: Charge students to nominate the school principal, teachers, or faculty members to take a pie to the face and hold a pep rally for all to see.
- ❖ Poster Contest Activity: Have students illustrate an aspect of United Way of Montcalm-Ionia Counties that they support the most such as 211 or VITA. Students, faculty, and visitors can pay to cast their vote for the best poster.
- ❖ **Sport Tournament:** Challenge a rival school or building to a friendly sport competition: Basketball, football, cheerleading, etc. Hold pep rallies and mini-fundraisers and contests leading up to the finale. (*I.e.: Tournament: Basketball / Mini fundraiser: T-Shirt Sale / Contest: Shoot-out*)
- Trivia Contest: Distribute printed questions/posters around the hallways about United Way and its programs every day for a week. The following week, remove the materials and distribute trivia questions. Students who correctly answer the most questions are entered into a drawing for a prize.
- ❖ Wild Hat Day: Entry fee is \$3.00. Students and adults can participate
- * Pass the Can: Fun to do at sporting events where you will have adults and students seated. Make an announcement that the funds are going the United Way. Even better if the competing team conducts one at the same time to see who raises the most at the event.
- * Snack Sales: Sell popcorn and drinks at school event, dance, or picnic with proceeds going to United Way
- Day at the Races: Students can team up to have their race day with kids pedal cars or trikes. Checkered flags and a mini racetrack create more fun.
- ❖ Card Sale: Students can make and sell cards for special events
- * Bake Sale: Students sell baked goods for donations to United Way

Let students, parents and staff know the campaign is coming.
